With More Than We Started Sam Dilbeck

Jesus' role as a shepherd is seen in Mark 6 when he fed five thousand people. Mark says, "When [Jesus] went ashore he saw a great crowd, and he had compassion on them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd" (Mark 6:34). They looked like sheep without a shepherd, but what do sheep with a shepherd look like?

The Good Shepherd leads us into rest. As the apostles returned from their limited commission they told Jesus all about their travels. I imagine it was like a bunch of preaching students coming together after knocking doors to recount the responses and reactions of those they encountered. In their excitement, they didn't notice their weariness, but Jesus did. He said, "Come away by yourselves to a desolate place and rest a while" (Mark 6:30-31).

Jesus knows life can be strenuous so he leads us to places of rest. Like King David we can attest, "He makes me lie down in green pastures" (Psa. 23:2). When the church meets we find rest in the assembly—a respite from the world and its stresses. Ultimately, however, our rest awaits us in heaven, "Therefore, while the promise of entering his rest still stands, let us fear lest any of you should seem to have failed to reach it" (Heb. 4:1).



The Good Shepherd leads us into knowledge. As Jesus and the disciples left in a boat for a desolate place the crowds followed on foot. When the boat came ashore, the people immediately surrounded them. Jesus scrapped his plan for rest when he saw the discordant, aimless, ignorant, lost multitude. They appeared to him “like sheep without a shepherd,” so he taught them (Mark 6:34).

We, like that ancient throng, need the guidance and knowledge of the Shepherd. Jeremiah admitted humanity’s plight, “I know, O Lord, that the way of man is not in himself, that it is not in man who walks to direct his steps” (Jer. 10:23). Sheep do not know where to find resources. They do not remember which pastures have been grazed. They do not know when they have gone astray. But the shepherd knows. When the Shepherd leads us, we know how to live.

The Good Shepherd leads us into nourishment. The masses grew tired and hungry while listening to him. So Jesus took the five loaves of bread and two fishes and turned them into a meal of great proportions. Everyone ate his fill and leftovers remained (Mark 6:35-44).

Jesus continues to lead us to spiritual food that does not perish (John 6:27). He fills us with righteousness (Mat. 5:6). He fills us with the Spirit (Eph. 5:18). He fills us with joy (Rom. 15:13). Jesus supplies whatever we need.

What do we look like when the Shepherd leads us? By ourselves we are wandering sheep, starving, wearied, and ignorant. But with Jesus we are healthy—fed, led, and rested. And, in the end heaven awaits us. When the Shepherd leads us, we finish with more than with what we started.
