The Pauline Corpus Sam Dilbeck

What happened to Paul's letter to Rome after he sent it? How was it preserved? When did all of Paul's letters come together as a unit that we call the Pauline corpus, or body of Paul's work?

For centuries people have been asking these questions, but there is little evidence. The earliest surviving copy of Paul's letters (\Box 46) dates to about 200 ad, though that date is debated among scholars. It contains Paul's letters to the churches and Philemon but does not include the Pastoral epistles (Titus and 1 & 2 Timothy).

Earlier documents attest to the Pauline corpus but are not manuscripts of the New Testament. For example, 1 Clement (written about 90 ad) refers to 1 Corinthians and quotes other passages from Paul. Marcion, an early church heretic, lists Paul's letters around 140 ad, but does not include the Pastorals. Polycarp (d. 156 ad) wrote a letter to the church in Philippi offering to share the letters that Smyrna had collected. The Muratorian fragment (200 ad) contains a list of NT books, including all thirteen letters (though in a different order). These early witnesses show Paul's letters were shared among churches by the middle of the second century.

Peter also refers to Paul's writings (2 Pet 3:15-16). Many scholars believe 2 Peter is pseudonymous (not written by Peter), and date it in the early second century, but that narrative is denied by those who believe in inspiration. Given Peter wrote 2 Peter as is purported, it is a very early witness to Paul's writings. Tradition says that Peter died in Rome by 68 ad, which fits with his location when writing his letters (1 Pet 5:13 if "Babylon" refers to Rome). Therefore, Peter recognized the authority of Paul's writings by 68. When was the Pauline corpus collected and published? Many theories speculate how this happened. One theory says Paul's letters fell into obscurity until the book of Acts was written (ca. 80 ad). Then interest renewed in Paul and a collector(s) sought to bring his letters together. Another theory says the letters were collected early in different regions—Asia, Achaia, Italy, etc. Then in time, the churches in these regions shared their collection with each other. Another theory supposes a close associate of Paul—Luke, Timothy, Onesimus began traveling and assembling the corpus shortly after Paul's death. These theories interpret the same data differently trying to account for different ordering, lists, and readings. However, there is a lot of speculation in each of them.

If we are speculating, let's consider another idea beginning with Paul. New Testament textual scholar, David Trobisch, examined private letter collections from 300 bc to 400 ad and concluded many of the collections began with the sender, not the recipient. Writers often kept copies of their letters, either for personal reference or with the intent to publish. Two contemporaries of Paul, Seneca and Cicero, both kept copies of their extensive epistolary corpus and published them. It is possible that Paul kept copies of his letters. Perhaps his personal collection of his letters are the "books" he desired Timothy to bring him (2 Tim 4:13).

Paul believed his writings were authoritative (1 Cor 14:37) and may have had intended to publish them in his lifetime. He kept the ones he thought were pertinent (we do not have all his letters 1 Cor 5:9; 2 Cor 7:8; Col 4:16) and shared them with those in his circle. Peter and Clement, who were in Rome with Paul near the end, would have seen his collection which was already being copied and published before his death. This allowed them to refer to Paul's letters in their own writings.

It cannot be proven the Pauline corpus was initiated with Paul. However, this scenario fits the biblical narrative, traditional history, and evidentiary data, while respecting the inspiration of the scriptures.
