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...trip ran from Friday-Wednesday, on Monday Chris hosted a special class for the students. During this "class time" we learned a bit from his personal experiences, and, perhaps more importantly, he practiced with us one of the most impactful strategies (so-to-say) that can help ensure the success of our ministry work for God and with Him.

I don't recall a particular title or label used for this exercise, but essentially all it comes down to is creating a space for God to fill relative the efforts He wants us to make concerning two things: 1) introducing God to people in an encouraging way that meets them where they are, and, 2) making sure that we, as disciples of Christ, lessen the hindrances of said introduction as much as possible so that the personal, relational connection can be one that lasts a lifetime. I'm certain there are several ways to describe those two points differently, but I phrased them as such for a few reasons. One of which directly ties back to some things I wrote about in my previous newsletter. And I have no doubt in my mind...

...that these two points are something you've thought of before or even talked about with other Christians. Perhaps even those in positions of leadership at your local congregation. These two points are often discussed in the classrooms here at BV as well.

I truly believe that the more we facilitate such conversations, prayerfully, with God's Word open in hand, in environments that are not seeking to uphold any man-made tradition above or in place of God's ways (kind of like the Pharisees are known for – and, unfortunately, to an extent, so too are the churches of Christ), then we are more free in Christ to experience His power that is made perfect in our weaknesses. And one of the best results of spiritual fruit to be tasted is successfully doing the work of bringing into fellowship with God the souls of those who are yet to be where He wants them to be – with Him in Christ – but also KEEPING in fellowship with Him everyone that has said yes to His love. Baptism, while necessary, is only the beginning of the eternal life for ALL in Christ. Let's finish strong together! (:
