Portrait of two women Sam Dilbeck

Nearby two women live light-years apart. Their homes, their philosophies, even their clothes separate them. Their worldviews rise like the Great Wall of China between them, but they are both looking for a mate.

Solomon tells how they conduct their lives. He names one woman Wisdom and the other Folly. In Proverbs 9, he reveals their conflicting natures and admonishes his readers to choose Wisdom, the responsible, caring, stable woman who challenges others to rise above foolishness and mediocrity. Sadly, Solomon knows man will be seduced by Folly and her instant gratification lifestyle.

Solomon begins by contrasting their work ethic. Wisdom builds a spacious house supported by seven pillars (Prov. 9:1). She raises livestock and vineyards and harvests their fruits to feed her household and neighbors (v. 2). But Folly sits on the front porch like Otis Redding at the dock of the bay. She watches for people to come her way as the hours slip away (v. 13-14). Instead of working for her food, she relies on "stolen water" and "bread eaten in secret," which refer to pilfered food (v. 17).

To be a companion of Wisdom, we must show industry. The Christian life is not a life of ease and relaxation, but one of service and work—a living sacrifice (Rom. 12:1-2). We serve one another (Gal. 5:13). We serve outsiders (Col. 4:5). We serve God (Heb. 9:14). Christians work to bear fruit for God's glory (John 15:7). Christians work out their own salvation (Phil. 2:12). Paul described the industrious life, "Let the thief no longer steal, but rather let him labor, doing honest work with his own hands, so that he may have something to share with anyone in need" (Eph. 4:28).

Next, the wise king contrasts their generosity. Wisdom offers her food and wine (Prov. 9:5). She sends her invitation throughout the city (vv. 3-4). Meanwhile, Folly offers the food of other people's labors. She takes more than she gives.

To embrace Wisdom, Christians must be generous with their resources. The first century church often shared their wealth with the church and one another (Acts 4:32-37). But they also showed generosity with unsaved people (Gal. 6:10). One of the hallmarks of Christianity is its emphasis on benevolence.

Then Solomon turned his gaze upon the intentions of Wisdom and Folly. Wisdom desires to help people improve their situation. She says to the simple, "Leave your simple ways...walk in the way of insight" (Prov. 9:6). On the other hand, Folly calls out to the simple and burdens them. She interrupts their journey (v. 15) and entices them to steal (v. 17).

Christians likewise seek to help and not harm (Mat. 10:16). They carry burdens instead of become burdens (Gal. 6:2). Their intentions are to help, not hinder (Mat. 18:6).

Another point of contrast is the women's introspection—how they see themselves. Wisdom is humble. She sends her invitation to the high places in town. These are the area where business and government are conducted. She invited important people to her home, hoping they would accept the invitation (Prov. 9:3). Folly feels important so she "takes a seat on the highest places of the town" (9:14).

Humility and deference characterize Christians. They know their debt of sin and are compelled to honor God and consider others ahead of themselves—two traits of humility. Paul described it, "For by the grace given to me I say to everyone among you not to think of himself more highly than he ought to think" (Rom. 12:3).

Finally, the difference between Wisdom and Folly is their destination. As Wisdom beckons to the simple, she offers them life, "Leave your simple ways and live" (Prov. 9:6), and "For by me your days will be multiplied, and years will be added to your life" (9:11). While Wisdom adds life, Folly removes it, "Whoever is simple, let him turn in here...but he does not know that the dead are there, that her guests are in the depths of Sheol" (9:16-18).

For the Christian, wisdom brings life—especially the wisdom of salvation (2 Tim. 3:15). People who embrace foolishness often find their life cut short and eternal life filled with suffering. Wisdom means knowing God, his will, and what glorifies him. Wisdom identifies sin and its consequences and avoids it.

Right now two women are vying for our attention and affection. Wisdom calls from the heights of heaven, begging us to join her in eternal bliss. Folly calls from the perishing depths of hell, enticing us to join her in her eternal misery. Each of us will answer one of these women.
