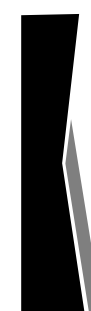

Theoretical Theology Sam Dilbeck

According to science, a theory is a hypothesis or guess that has been tested to some degree, but has not been proven. The foundation of the theory is the unknown. Things that are known with certainty cannot be correctly called a theory. A theory is formed when the principles of nature are observed and a prediction is made with respect to the unknown of certain events.

In recent years, mankind seems to have determined that God’s scheme of redemption is really only a theory. Ironically, God knows all things, hence nothing is a theory to God. However, the attitude that God’s scheme is a theory can be seen in the atheists’ attack on God; the denominationalists’ creation of a new plan of salvation; the liberals’ desire to change the plan; and the carnally-minded’s failure to stick to the plan. Here our goal is to look at some ways that we as average Christians have turned God’s scheme of redemption into God’s “theory of redemption.”

The “Theory” of Spirituality

God expects His children to be spiritually minded. The Bible says that such a mind is “life” and “peace” (Rom. 8:6). “If we live by the Spirit, by the Spirit let us also walk” (Gal. 5:25). These principles seem like they would work, but we do not believe it. We decide that it is better for us to put our jobs before God. We consider our physical family before our spiritual family. The feast we gorge on each night is physical and we rarely break the bread of life. We have decided that God’s “theory of redemption” does not work and that we have a better plan. Do we really think that our plan is better than God’s plan?

The “Theory” of Service

The Bible clearly teaches that Christians are to serve the church. For example, men are to lead in public worship (1 Tim. 2:8). Through love we are to “be servants one to another” (Gal. 5:13). By encouraging and exhorting one another we are serving the church (Heb. 10:25). Sadly, we look at these obligations of service to the church as a suggestive theory. We discount their ability to make us righteous (Rom. 6:16-18). Instead, we have our own theory. Our theory says that God is a liar and that He does not really want us to lift a finger to serve Him. So we sit back, relax, and refuse to help in leading worship, in encouraging our brethren or in visitation and we put our theory to the test. Do we really believe that our wisdom is greater than the wisdom of God (1 Cor. 1:20-21)?

The “Theory” of Evangelism

The greatest commission that has been placed in the life of the Christian is that of evangelism. Jesus gave this responsibility to all Christians just before His ascension into heaven (Matt. 28:19-20; Mark 16:15-16; Luke 24:46-48; John 20:21-23). Paul emphasized the importance of the commission in Romans 10:13-15 “For whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved. How then shall they call on Him in whom they have not believed? and how shall they believe in Him of whom they have not heard? and how shall they hear without a preacher? And how shall they preach, except they be sent? as it is written, How beautiful are the feet of them that preach the gospel of peace, and bring glad tidings of good things!” Here again, we have formulated a theory to compete against what God has said. We have guessed that the responsibility falls solely upon the preacher and maybe the elders. In our arrogance, we have decided that since it makes us “uncomfortable” or “nervous” to approach someone with the gospel, we can be saved without doing it. Our hope is that as we leave our obligation of evangelism undone, God is going to see the wisdom in our theory and redeem us apart from His revealed scheme.

Conclusion

It is as if we are saying that in theory God’s scheme of redemption looks good, but in actuality it will never work. So we devise our own plan of mellow apathy and steady stagnation and daily put it to the test. May God help us to see the error of our ways! May He help us to see that the books opened on the Day of Judgment will not include any tomes of human philosophy or texts of theological theories. No, those books will include only the laws of the scheme of redemption through all the ages (Rev. 20:12). Our only hope is to abandon our vain theories and adhere to His eternal plan.
