It happened... 2 brethren killed during worship by Clint Brown

It happened. A local congregation's worst nightmare. An armed man comes into the assembly of the saints and murders worshipers in cold blood. The December 30, 2019 shooting at the West Freeway Church of Christ in White Settlement, Texas was a horrific act of evil perpetrated against God's people.

But what should be the primary response from the Lord's church on occasions like this? In short, it is summed up by Jesus' own words from the cross as he was being unjustly attacked by evil people: "Father, forgive them for they do not know what they do" (Lk. 23:34). An attitude of mercy and forgiveness was at the forefront of Jesus' mind at the height of his suffering. This should also be the basic attitude of Christians.

First, our primary message should not be about politics. Though Bible believers naturally gravitate to American political conservatism, and we seriously seek to expose the lies and hypocrisy of political and social progressivism, we must remember our Lord's primary response. While on the cross Jesus didn't call for legal and social reform. He called for love and forgiveness. While his entire teaching ministry serves as the basis of true social justice and legal reform, he considered the call for forgiveness to be the only true power to convert the human heart. Proper laws and social structures are essential to a healthy society but only the love of Christ can truly change a human soul forever.

Secondly, our primary message should not be about patriotism. As Christians we accept the Christian duty to protect our neighbors and loved ones from gratuitous evil, and we fight for our Second Amendment right to bear arms. We believe the command to love your neighbor can include the need for a citizen to kill a violent criminal in the act of murder or other violent crime, and that the government bears the sword to punish an evildoer—even, if necessary, to the point of death (Rom. 13:1-4). But again, we must consider the example of Jesus. At the height of his unjust suffering, Jesus didn't call for justice, but for mercy. There should be no question that Jesus is for justice to finally be done on evil, but he used the circumstances of his own experience of injustice as an opportunity for God's love to be displayed to the world. As followers of Christ, we must respond to an evil tragedy first as Christians and only secondly as Americans.

Our primary message should be God's compassion and forgiveness. Our message should reverberate with the gospel of Christ. The gospel was certainly on display in one of our brothers at West Freeway following that tragedy. Brother John Richardson is a long-time member of the church where two of his brothers were killed. In an interview shortly after the shooting he said concerning the murderer, "We have to understand that this poor man... and I don't know what his mental state was... but my heart goes out to his family because they have to live with this. And we have to remember that he is a creature of God just like we are. It was a sad thing that he had to come into the assembly and hurt people, and it was a sad thing that we had to hurt him. But I don't have any hate for this person. ...We can't have any hate for anybody that has hate for us. ...We have to live life for Christ and to teach and preach and be an example of his on earth to every person we meet. ...We have to love everybody with the love of Christ..."

Brother Richardson's words were clearly prompted by the gospel of Christ. This is Jesus' own emphasis. This attitude is completely unexpected by those of the world. But when God's people respond in this unexpected way with grace and mercy it makes a huge impact on the people of the world. It truly shows the love of Christ in our hearts. And isn't that what living the Christian life is all about?
